Green

- The Rudd Government rightly recognises the importance of saving native forests in neighbouring countries such as Indonesia and Papua New Guinea as carbon sinks, and yet we continue to subsidise the destruction of our own carbon dense forests.
- Australia is ignoring emissions from native forest woodchipping and exaggerating the CO2 uptake from forestry. We must count both.
- An old forest is best. It is the total carbon storage in a forest that counts, not the rate of CO2 uptake.
- Enormous emissions result from burning of logging waste and soil Disturbance and wood product degradation but the Government plans to deem all these emissions as "zero."
